GOLDEN-WINGS (GW) – What got you interested in birds, and in what year did you start birding?

KW – A way we can get young people interested in nature is combining things they like. Most young people are obsessed with their phone, but you can tell them about different apps that involve birding and they can track how many birds they see and see how much they improve as a birder over time.
